Kindergarten

Our students have settled back into their second term at school. We welcome our new teacher, Tajpreet Gill to the Kindergarten Silverfish class. They are showing more skills by assisting to keep their classroom tidy and looking after their belongings such as lunch boxes and bags.

During literacy lessons students continue to learn the name and sound of all the letters in the alphabet. They are working on making short sentences using one or two topic words and connecting with some high frequency words, such as 'the', 'a', and 'is'. Students are listening to stories every day and are given opportunities to speak about characters and action of the story, and

During maths lessons they are counting items to 20. We use hand-on approach with counters and other concrete items. The children are counting their days at school are getting excited as they are halfway to being at school for 100 days. They are learning the names of common two-dimensional shapes and looking in the environment to see things that are those shapes.

The inquiry for our kindergarten students is learning to sequence personal experiences in order such as things that happened when they were a baby, toddler, pre-schooler and things that happen during this year at school. To promote healthy eating habits, children are encouraged to eat a piece of fruit during the morning session. Please send in an easy to manage fruit item, such as a banana, grapes or apple every day. Tricky food packaging is difficult for our children. Please assist them by opening the packet at home.

The first school bell happens at 8:55. We begin our learning when we come in from the morning gathering. Please ensure your child is at school in time to be settled and ready for our morning learning.

Year 6 Food Elective

We have a new Year 6 class this term and everybody is very excited to start cooking. We will be making a whole range of dishes from pancakes and brownies to hamburgers. We will also study some nutrition, food safety and hygiene and create an advertisement for a food product. We hope to have a Master Chef cook off at the end of the term where every student can compete against each other.



Year 7 English

This term, we have looked at poems and persuasive texts. At the start of the term, we learnt about poetic techniques such as personification and alliteration. Next, we learnt how to make haiku poems and the format and then we eventually wrote a Haiku poem ourselves. Later, we looked at the other types of poems including slam poetry and free verse. After we learnt all of this, an assignment was handed to us where we had to write a slam poem or a free verse poem with 300 words minimum and write a rationale about the poem written.

Our next unit was persuasive texts and their techniques. For example, we first learnt about three Latin terms known as Pathos, Logos and Ethos. We also looked at more techniques including the rule of three, Rhetorical questions and evidence. Next, we had practice on writing a persuasive text on whether social media is toxic or not. After the practice, we had to choose a topic to persuade someone about that topic. The topic could be advertising an item or brand or persuading someone about an environmental or social issue. Some topic examples that were chosen were racism, the willow project, stereotypes, inequality, why petrol cars are better than electric cars, and why PlayStation is the superior gaming device brand. This assignment had to be presented towards an audience (the class) as a speech. This speech had to be about 3 minutes long.

In term 2, we have been looking at myths and legends. We have been looking at the differences between myths, legends, folktales and fairy tales. We have studied the Legend of Robin Hood and have also gone over some other myths and legends very briefly such as the legend of King Arthur, the myth of Pandora's box and the myth of Persephone and Demeter.



In our school, all students from kindergarten through to year 10 are all taught and encouraged to demonstrate positive behaviours in all areas of the school. Some areas of the school have specific behaviours that are important, such as wearing safety goggles in a laboratory or a workshop. But there are some behaviours that, regardless of where we are around the school, we should always be demonstrating. These are called 'all areas' behaviours and are posted around the school. They include behaviours such as speaking respectfully and looking after school property. Last term we updated our posters so they are easy to see wherever you are around the school.

When students demonstrate positive behaviours, they are recognised by teachers as being safe, respectful learners and are receiving acknowledged by Each 'highflyers'. student's highflyer tally is tracked and once they have accumulated a certain number they will be awarded with different level awards: bronze. silver, gold, platinum etc. All award levels come with some sort of reward. Additionally, students from the high school will also go into a draw when receiving a highflyer to win a prize.




Library News


Shine Om kids yoga allows children to learn yoga poses and strategies to 'calm the farm' to help manage heightened emotions.
