
### Kindergarten


Kindergarten students are very proud of the progress they are making with writing. Everyday students practise writing simple sentences using capital letters at the beginning and punctuation at the end of their sentences. In Maths, we are learning to ask questions to collect data and make inferences from the data. We are planning to learn about position and understand simple maps in the coming weeks.

For our Inquiry, we are learning how different things move for example, a ball rolls, a book slides. This is a fun topic to ask big questions and observe moving things in our environment. We encourage reading regularly with our enthusiastic kindergarten students. If you have any questions, please contact your child's teacher for an appointment.









### Year 3

Welcome back to the last term of year three!!! We are so proud of you all and can't wait to get back into the rest of the terms learning.

We have been starting off by writing instructional texts. We attempted to teach Mr Bayley how to sit on a chair and drink a glass of water. Some of the instructions weren't descriptive enough and Mr Bayley had some accidents, we had fun and after some edits became successful. We are going to continue working on our instructional texts over the coming weeks to develop some truly wonderful skills.

We have also been working hard on fractions. We have done some great hands on learning and got more comfortable with all of the numbers between numbers. We've really been measuring up to the task of mass. We have discovered how to weight things accurately and understanding what we can measure in grams and kilograms.

Term 4 has been a great time to learn about the rotation of the earth, working out how the day and night cycle works and why we have seasons. It has been out of this world.

We have begun to start researching significant people of the past. Australia has had some truly interesting people, and we are really looking forward to learning all about them. We are beginning to learn some tennis and skills in our PE lessons and it has been super fun to learn some new tricks.

Term 4 is starting out really strong and we are really keen to get all the learning we need to get done to be ready for year 4!

### The Depot

The Depot students have spent the term researching pets. We learnt about habitats and diet. Did you now that guineas pigs need to eat all the time so their teeth don't grow too long? We researched what each animal needs to be healthy and happy. Some pets were harder to care for than others. Some needed lots of space and others needed special heaters. After doing lots of research we decided to trial Guinea pigs to see if they make good class pets. We have three guinea pigs that are on loan to us. We have learned how to care for them – we know what each one likes to eat and how they like to be held and patted. We also know how to recognise when the guinea pigs want to be left alone. We are transferring our new knowledge into social situations. We have been surprised to find that they also help us to feel calm. If you need help choosing a pet we can help











### Year 6

Term 3 saw our year 6 classes exploring the states of matter. They participated in an experiment to demonstrate how matter could transition from a solid to a liquid and then into a gas. They designed experiments to add or remove energy and move water through it's different states. The year 6ers identified, described and demonstrated the properties of each state of matter.

This term, our year 6 classes will be delving into energy and electricity. They will be exploring how we as a society generate electricity and explore the benefits and downsides to renewable and non-renewable energy sources. We will be transforming energy from chemical forms into potential and kinetic energy as we strive to develop an understanding of how our world is powered and how we can power it better in the future. Already we have observed that the school is generating a large amount of it's own electricity through it's new solar panels (by turning photons into electricity) and we observed how plants do almost the same thing naturally (turning photons in an energy source they can use.)

The students will be creating simple circuits to power lights and small motors and engaging in a research task that will involve some model building. It's going to be an awesome term!





### Kids in Space

Last term, a team of six Kingsford Smith School year 6 students entered and won the 2023 Kids in Space competition. The competition involved the whole of 6 White identifying a current problem in space (our team investigated how to build a habitat on the Moon for when the Artemis Astronauts arrive), devise a solution to the problem (our team decided to design a fleet of robotic builders that could use the natural resources on the Moon to 3D print a habitat), design the means to solve the problem (using 3D design software Makers Empire), 3D print the robotic builders using our 3D printers, review their designs, redesign and reprinting final models. Then a team of 6 students volunteered to be our spokespeople at the Kids in Space Showcase where they had to create a display to show off their work and explain to the judges the process and thinking they had developed to solve their problem. We walked away from that showcase victorious and were immediately entered into the National Finals!

The National Finals will be happening from the 29<sup>th</sup> until the 31<sup>st</sup> October at the Australian Space Agency in Adelaide and our amazing team will go up against the winners from every other state in Australia. While the prize money we received from winning the ACT Kids in Space round did not cover all of our expenses and I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank theses people and organisations who have helped our students raise the money to get to Adelaide.

Makers Empire- Prize money \$4,6000 Beth Beresford and Phil Wilkinson- Donated \$1,000 Rotary Club of Canberra- Donated \$1,000 Draco Scout Fellowship- Donated \$1,000 Rotary Club of Belconnen- Donated \$1,500 The Masons- Lodge Commonwealth- Donated \$500 We were also able to raise money through our ongoing KSS Container Deposit Scheme (CDS), amounting to \$594 and, as a result of our efforts in running the KSS CDS we also won *The Canberra Times ACT CDS Eniron Champion* competition and received \$500 as prize money.

In total, through community support and hard work, we have been able to raise \$10,694 which will cover airfare, accommodation, travel and food for our entire team!

Good luck to the team, I know you will all do your best and show Australia what students from Kingsford Smith School are capable of!



### Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL)

As part of our Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL) framework that underpins our ethos here at Kingsford Smith School of all students being safe, respectful learners - we are committed to reviewing our whole school approach to the prevention of bullying behaviours within our school.

The first step in this process is developing a school wide understanding of what bullying is and why students use bullying behaviour. Last week in our whole school sector meeting, all teachers viewed and discussed the current national definition of bullying.

→ 'Bullying is an ongoing and deliberate misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that intends to cause physical, social and/or psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power, or perceived power, over one or more persons who feel unable to stop it from happening. Bullying can happen in person or online, via various digital platforms and devices and it can be obvious (overt) or hidden (covert). Bullying behaviour is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time (for example, through sharing of digital records). Bullying of any form or for any reason can have immediate, medium and long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders. Single incidents and conflict or fights between equals, whether in person or online, are not defined as bullying.
